



Pupil Premium Impact 2015-2016

The government has allocated a specific grant to every school, beginning in 2011/2012. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and their wealthier peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. In the financial year 2015-2016 our pupil premium allocation was £25,080.

2015-2016 Action Plan

1. Recorders and tuition so that all children in Year 2 can learn to play an instrument.
2. Fund trips and events
3. Counselling for some FSM children.
4. A member of the senior leadership team monitors the progress of pupil premium pupils, supports staff (teaching and non-teaching) with planning interventions to narrow any gaps.
5. Reduce class sizes in Year 1 and 2 for some literacy and maths sessions to ensure children's needs are better met- support teacher to plan for these groups of pupils, model and evaluate good teaching.
6. Introduce mentoring for pupil premium pupils- pre-learning and over learning using pupil premium teaching assistant.

Total: £25,080

Impact

- In reading for the 2016 cohort 50% of children made at least expected progress from end of EYFS. 25% made better than expected progress.
- In writing for the 2016 cohort 75% of children made at least expected progress from end of EYFS. 25% made better than expected progress.
- In Maths for the 2016 cohort 75% of children made at least expected progress from end of EYFS. 25% made better than expected progress.
