


Family Learning

Choose a family learning activity each week. You can choose which one to do and in which order you do them. For when you have a busy weekend we have included a Family week. These are suggestions of things which you might do and there is no need to record anything in your homework book for the family week, unless you wish to. Homework books must be in school on **Wednesday**.

<p><u>Maths</u> 20 people sit on two carriages on a train. How many different ways can they sit? Could you record your answer as a number sentence e.g. $2 + 18 = 20$ Challenge: What if 100 people get on the train?</p>  <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>	<p><u>Literacy</u> Use non-fiction books to find out about Steam Trains. Then you need to draw a detailed picture of a Steam Train and label it.</p> <p>Challenge: Write sentences about your steam Train using conjunctions e.g. because, but, and.</p> <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>	<p><u>History</u> Can you find out about Isambard Kingdom Brunel and record your findings in your family learning book. You could find out:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• When was Brunel born?• Where did he live?• Why was he famous? <p>Challenge: Why was the work that Brunel did so important?</p> <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>
<p><u>Science</u> Can you find out what a food chain is and make your own?</p> <p>Challenge: Can you think about what would happen if an animal was missing from the food chain?</p> <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>	<p><u>Art</u> Look at a photograph of a steam train and talk about what you see. You will then need to, using different materials, make your own steam train picture. Please do this on a separate piece of paper, not in your home learning book, so that we can display some in the classroom.</p> <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>	<p><u>Family Week</u> For example: - a walk in the woods - a visit to the library - a visit to a museum Or Family Week This is free for whatever lovely activity you choose to do together one weekend.</p> <p>Signature of Teacher:</p>
